The end of Time for Creation 2025 was marked on October 4, 2025, by the receipt of a beautiful gift: the Apostolic Exhortation DILEXI TE (I HAVE LOVED YOU) from Pope LEO XIV on LOVE FOR THE POOR. "Our love and our deepest convictions need to be continually cultivated, and we do so through our concrete actions (...). Love is above all a way of looking at life and a way of living it. A Church that sets no limits to love, that knows no enemies to fight but only men and women to love, is the Church that the world needs today", the Holy Father reminds us in Nos. 119 and 120.

In October, in a spirit of solidarity, we celebrated with three organisations supported by the general administration. Their work brings joy and hope to vulnerable people in our society, demonstrating this boundless love. At La Rue des Femmes in Montreal, we attended the inauguration of Maison Léonie, the foundation's fourth specialised house. It is staffed by people who provide a warm welcome and support to help homeless women rebuild their lives. At the Sault-Saint-Louis Palliative Care Home gala, we discovered an exceptional place where people can live comfortably until their last days. At the Roncalli International Foundation's 45th anniversary celebrations, we gave thanks for 45 years of action and hope for disadvantaged people around the world.

- Reduce waste and promote sustainability in our environment.






- Encourage biodiversity: plant varieties of plants and flowers that attract pollinators and promote biodiversity.
